LOCAL RECOVERY PLAN

Local Government Recovery Infrastructure Program (LGRIP) - \$13,362,253

- Focus on assisting local governments and tribal communities in their infrastructure recovery needs
 - Eligible project types: sewer and drainage improvement or construction, roadway repairs
 - Ineligible project types: Dredging, removal of vegetation or debris, emergency management plans
- May include mitigation activities within project
- Awards will be made through an application process

Purpose and Goals

LGRIP CAPACITY BUILDING SESSIONS

What is the Local Government Recovery Infrastructure Program Capacity Building process?

- Opportunity for municipalities and stakeholders to weigh-in on how the program can use the CDBG-DR funds most effectively
- Input will influence the LGRIP application process, application scoring and selection criteria, and program roll-out
- Goal is to design the program and application process to ensure the most critical projects are supported

When will funds be available?

- Baldwin County will be able to start programs after ADECA approves the LRP
- Proposals or applications for LGRIP projects can be collected when programs launch *(goal to launch within Quarter 1, 2025)*



- Budget detail and Funding request
- Project timeline
- Project description and need
- How Project will meet requirements
- How Organization will meet requirements (Capacity, Experience)
- Details on how to submit, how the information will be scored, and timeline for decisions

- ☑ Project information (type and narrative)
- ☑ Project location
- ☑ CDBG-DR requirements (National Objective, needs, benefits)
- Applicant capacity and experience
- ☑ Budget requires cost details and other funding sources



CDBG - Disaster Recovery (DR)

OVERVIEW

- CDBG-DR funds are used to assist local communities in:
 - Recovering housing losses,
 - Rebuilding infrastructure,
 - Addressing economic revitalization needs,
 - Funding planning and public services, and
 - Becoming more resilient to future disasters to reduce damages.

CDBG-DR Requirements

OVERVIEW

Recovery projects must:

- Be an eligible activity under HUD's CDBG-DR program and ADECA's LRPP Program Guidelines
- Meet a National Objective
 - Priority is to benefit low- and moderate-income individuals or households (LMI) however urgent need projects will be considered
- Have a clear "tie-back" or relation to Hurricane Sally and/or Zeta and address direct or indirect disaster-related impacts
- Must fill an unmet need for the recovery area

Eligible Project Activities

CDBG-DR REQUIREMENTS

The goal of infrastructure programming is to rebuild public facilities and systems to be more resilient to future disasters and to restore impacted communities.

- Sewer and drainage improvements (including resulting work, e.g., road reconstruction, due to sewer and drainage construction), and
- Roadway improvements (including medians and other structures, e.g., signage and drainage, in relation to roadway construction).

National Objective

CDBG-DR REQUIREMENTS

Serve Low-to-Moderate Income (LMI) Households

- LMI projects will be prioritized
- Two ways to meet LMI National Objective
 - Area benefit activities (LMA) benefits are available to the residents in a particular area, where at least 51% of residents are low- and moderateincome persons.
 - 2. Limited clientele activities (LMC) benefits a limited clientele, at least 51% of whom are low- and moderate-income persons.


CDBG-DR REQUIREMENTS

Address an Urgent Need

- Why does a specific project have particular urgency?
- How do existing conditions pose a serious and immediate threat to the health or welfare of the community?
- How will the project respond to the urgency, type, scale, and location of the disaster-related impact as described within the Local Recovery Plan?

Tie-Back to Storm

CDBG-DR REQUIREMENTS



Eligible Costs

CDBG-DR REQUIREMENTS

- Project management (including hiring of consultants to comply with CDBG-DR regulations and grant requirements)
- Planning and design fees associated with the construction
- Construction management and project inspections
- Acquisition and permitting fees, as applicable
- Construction (labor and materials) costs

Environmental Review

CDBG-DR REQUIREMENTS

National Environmental Policy Act of 1969; 24 CFR PARTS 50, 51, 55, 58

- Requires Federal agencies to consider the environmental impact of proposed actions early in the planning and decision-making process.
- Analysis of the impact of a project on the surrounding environment and vice versa.
- Ensures that HUD funded projects provide decent, safe, and sanitary housing.
- Demonstrates compliance with up to 17 federal environmental laws and authorities.
- Must be conducted before funds are committed.
- Requires that documents be available to the public.



LRP PRIORITIES



The intent of the LRPP is to better understand the vulnerability of disaster-impacted populations, thereby assisting subrecipients in identifying activities that will have the greatest impact to meet the unmet recovery and/or mitigation needs of those most vulnerable populations.

- ADECA LRPP Guidelines

MID Recovery Zones

LRP PRIORITIES

- Most Impacted or Distressed (MID)
 Recovery zones are areas that meet the
 following conditions:
 - Where vulnerable populations reside; and
 - 2. Where local unmet needs exist.
- MID Recovery Zones may identify areas or populations with the most need and could be defined in the LRP.




Figure 1: MID Recovery Zone Requirements



Mitigation

LRP PRIORITIES

Mitigation activities reduce risks and impacts from future storms by increasing resilience to disasters, reducing or eliminating long-term risk of loss of life, injury, and property, and lessening the impact of future disasters.

Projects may show mitigation efforts in a project by documenting:


- How proposed activities will advance long-term resilience
- How proposed mitigation measures will be integrated into rebuilding activities and align with regional/local plans and policies to advance long-term resilience to natural hazards.
- Alignment of potential and planned public and private investments with other for state/local capital improvements.




